INJURIES WERE FATAL.

John C. Guill of Mapleton Died Friday of Injuries Sustained When Cow Dragged Him.

Friday morning at 3 o'clock John C. Guill of Mapleton died at his home there as the result of injuries received a number of weeks ago when he was dragged by a cow. Mr. Guill was leading the animal when it suddenly became wild and uncontrollable and, throwing him to the ground and entangling him in the rope, dragged him a considerable distance, causing a fracture of one of his hips and other very severe injuries. Owing to the fact that Mr. Guill was a man of 76 years of age, the injuries were doubly serious. Since the accident he has been confined to his bed and no hope of his recovery has been entertained. The deceased is survived by a wife and five children, among whom is Mrs. Faulkner, who lives on Margrave street in this city.

The funeral was held yesterday morning at 11 o'clock from the Methodist church in Mapleton, Rev. Siegel of Prescott officiating. Interment was in the Fairview cemetery at Fulton.
